

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Legal counsel, Janet Morningstar, reported that she attended the Legal Affairs Committee at the ΛCWA Conference and that ACWA had adopted recommendations for legislation to manage groundwater basins in the state. The Legal Affairs Committee formed a committee to review bills and provide input and suggested changes. Key issues involve the definition of "sustainable" with respect to groundwater management, and protection of water rights of overlying and appropriative users. Consideration is being given to provide authority to the managing agencies to collect fees and restrict ground water extraction. They anticipate that groundwater management plans will be finalized within five years and that all basins will be managed and problems resolved within twenty years. Ms. Morningstar also noted that she has volunteered to serve on a committee to complete a Proposition 218 update to the ΛCWA booklet.

Subject: Investment Update - May 2014

Economic Review: The next meeting of the Federal Reserve is scheduled for June 17th. The last meeting was held on April 29th. The Fed Funds rate remains at a target range of 0 to ¼ percent. At the meeting, the Federal Reserve stated that "growth in economic activity has picked up recently, after having slowed sharply during the winter. Labor market indicators were mixed but on balance showed further improvement. The unemployment rate remains clevated. Household spending appears to be rising more quickly. Business fixed investment edged down, while the recovery in the housing sector remained slow." The latest reading of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Los Angeles, Riverside and Orange Counties was 1.6 for the month of April. The previous reading was 1.0 in March.

LAIF Update: LAIF ended the month of May with a yield of 0.23%. This represents a .01 basis point change from the month of April. A comparison with last year shows LAIF .02 basis points lower than May 2013 when the yield stood at 0.25%.

RWD Investments: Rowland Water District's bond portfolio carries an average yield of 1.38%. This represents a .05 basis point decrease from the month of April. This represents a 1.15 basis point premium to LAIF. The District had one bond purchase and one maturity in the month of April. The maturity was a 5-year \$250,000 FNMA bond with a yield of 2.50%. The District reinvested in a 5-Year \$250,000 US Treasury note with a yield of 1.27%. The District CD Placement program carries an effective yield of 0.48% and an average maturity of 620 days.




CY 2014 PM-22 Water Purchases

CY 2014 Rowland JWL Purchases







Water Purchases for CY 2014 (Acre-feet)








Website Visits and Pageviews

Summary: The Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2006, an initiative statute approved by the voters as Proposition 84 at the November 7, 2006, statewide general election, makes approximately \$5.4 billion in bond funds available for safe drinking water, water quality and supply, flood control, natural resource protection, and park improvements. The initiative bond act makes \$60,000,000 available to the State Department of Public Health for the purpose of loans and grants for projects to prevent or reduce contamination of groundwater that serves as a source of drinking water and requires the department to require repayment for costs that are subsequently recovered from parties responsible for the contamination. Existing law requires the department, in collaboration with the Department of Toxic Substances Control, or DTSC, and the State Water Resources Control Board, to develop and adopt regulations governing the repayment of costs that are subsequently recovered from parties responsible for the contamination of groundwater. This bill would eliminate the requirement to develop and adopt regulations and instead would require that costs subsequently recovered from a party responsible for the contamination, as defined, be repaid to the State Department of Public Health and deposited, and separately accounted for, in the Groundwater Contamination Cleanup Project Fund, which this bill would create In the State Treasury. This bill would require moneys in the fund to be continuously appropriated, without regard to fiscal years, to the Department of Toxic Substances Control for a grant to the grantee that received a grant to prevent or reduce contamination of groundwater pursuant to Proposition 84 and subsequently recovered costs from a responsible party and repaid those costs to the state. This bill would require the Department of Toxic Substances Control to disburse the funds upon receipt of an expenditure plan from the grantee if the department reviews the plan and concurs that the proposed expenditures by the grantee are consistent with certain requirements. This bill would prohibit the total amount of a grant from the fund and a grant received to prevent or reduce contamination of groundwater pursuant to Proposition 84 from exceeding the grantee's total costs to cleanup contaminated groundwater or prevent the contamination of groundwater. 





Director's And General Manager's Comments

Summary Report On the CSDA Legislative Days May 20 & 21, 2014

The CSDA events opened after Welcoming & Opening Remarks with a panel reporting on a Legislative over view;

Points made were giving the timeline for action on bill this legislative secession remaining those so called deadlines on bill action is May 24 each house (Assembly & Senate) complete action on original bills, May 30 those bills must be exchanged (sent) to the other body for action.

The time the legislature will be in secession to act in this remaining year is only June and August because the legislature is scheduled to take a month of July summer recess, followed by after August to adjourn for the remainder of 2014 (September to December)

The panel reported on the Governor's 2013-2014 State Budget revise which the Governor has committed higher than expected Tax revenues are to be committed to meet the demands to support the expanding of both Medical and CalforniaCare per the federal ACA of 2010 legislation that President Obama is directing via Presidential executive directives/orders.

The one bright point is that the Governor has committed 100 million to pay for pre 2004 state so called borrowing from local government (Special Districts)

The following Panel address Tax Reform and State Infrastructure:

- There was a review of the Cap and Trade auction that will generate "New" revenue and what appears the main vehicle AB 32 to apportion those funds of course the CSDA has it's AB 1970 to request some of those funds.
- 2) The Public Pension issue is still a hot potato as the legislature is still looking to draw back, cut and tighten further on defining those retired who work as "Double Dipping", that PERS is looking into collapsing the eleven (11) risk pools it has now into simply two (2) one High risk the other low risk.
- 3) The State has created a massive problem with the infrastructure because of deferred maintenance of what does exist, the refusal to build/import/expand to support the needs of a state that has doubled its population over time that now requires a low of 750 BILLION if not over "ONE TRILLION DOLLARS" to be spent in the next 10 years to just maintain the present standard/quality of life.
- 4) The lone brave member of the panel Fred Silva of California Forward (yes they are still out there now working in the shadows) was willing to opening call for what Cal Forward labels a new paradigm to increase taxes and fees the vehicle being AB 2403 and ballot initiatives. At the least to reopen California's Prop 13 property Tax imitative to create a dual tax roll for commercial (business) separate from residential and require that every residential property that has not been assessed (per change of ownership) over 5 years be assessed per existing market value.

Last Panel for the morning was the rare Republican Chair Katcho Achadjian of the Assembly Local Government Committee and the Democratic Vice-Chair Marc Levine. Basically together they seemed to be a pair of members that are seeking to do good for the State as a whole but are burdened by partisan leadership (vast majority Democrat and the almost non-existent Republican minority).

During the after lunch Legislative visits I was teamed with a pair of neighbors; MS. Lana Haddad, from the Western Municipal Water District (Leader) MS. Betty Ann Anderson, Jurupa Community Services District

The mission goal was to lobby for the CSAD position on three key bills AB 1897, AB 1970 and AB 2280 (see attached CSDA info sheet). We of course also touched on the Water bond measure presenting a ACWA pro-water position.

Lana, Betty and I got along the visits likely were somewhat effective in getting our team's input listened too.

We spoke to Matt Roman the Capitol Office Director of 60th district Assembly member Eric Linder.

Shrujal Joseph the Legislative Aide for Senator Roth of the 31st SD of the three key bills, what was of note is finally had one of those lobbying meetings in the hall because of the overcrowding from having other visiting groups present.

Last and best was our CSDA team had both the Communications Director Ava Sanchez and her Assembly member Jose Medina of the 61st AD, we had a break in that Betty had a long time personal connection with the Assemblyman.

I came away with the impression that even without a firm commitment of support or opposition the talking points we made were listened to and noted.

The Keynote address of the second day was the Assembly Speaker Emeritus John Perez who in my opinion delivered a stump speech.

It was then followed by a panel addressing a Workforce Roadmap for the future, strangely the only panel member who was speaking to work force session planning was the SEIU rep Terry Brennand. Unfortunately the Moderator Mrs. Palmer of a Healthcare district for some reason outright redirected if not derailed anything but a mention of that subject.

The CSDA Legislative Days wrap up was a series of information panels of which was set up so you could sit through two (2) and be educated.

I sat with the ACWA as one and please refer to the various alternatives to the Existing Water Bond.

The second was the Covered California Care Health care program to learn more of how it could affect the Health Insurance the District offers, under the combined ACA of 2010 and the continuing Presidential application via executive directions/orders by Obama.

As a side note ran across Ken Manning who was on his way to a Governor Brown meeting on the California Drought.
